

UNPRECEDENTED INVESTMENT IN HIGHWAYS INFRASTRUCTURE

Hampshire County Council will invest a record £90 million in highway improvement schemes, maintenance, and flood alleviation, as well as improvements to town centres and road safety.

Prospective County Councillor Jan Warwick said *“This huge investment in our transport infrastructure shows how our Conservative led authority puts the prosperity of the county first, investing in schemes to improve local journey times and provide better access for our residents”.*

Hampshire Highways will be using its own recyclable materials for local road repairs. Speaking about this, Cllr Rob Humby said *“Maintaining over 5,280 miles of roads is no easy task. Our Highways Team have used their expertise to develop this innovative approach. These materials are not only safer to use but are also better for the environment.”*

Earlier this summer the County’s Highways team introduced a pioneering mobile asphalt production unit to improve the efficiency of highway repairs. This new equipment will reduce wasted material as it can be mixed on site and used straight away.

Almost half of the total investment, £44.53 million, will be allocated towards Highway maintenance to make local roads more resilient to the impact of extreme weather and the growing volume of traffic.

NEWS IN BRIEF.....

- The new Transport Strategy for Winchester will take account of development to improve access along all the main traffic corridors in and out of the City.
- Parishes continue to receive £1000 from Hampshire County Council towards employing their own Lengthsmen who can cut back hedges, clear ditches and rights of way.
- Local residents and commuters now face less disruption on the road network thanks to the County Council securing better co-ordination with the utility companies when road works are necessary.

SUPERFAST BROADBAND

Councillor Jan Warwick said *“It is good news that Hampshire County Council has approved new plans to extend superfast broadband to 97.4% of the county by 2019. This will help business and residents particularly in rural areas.”*

Hampshire Superfast Broadband already covers over 80% of the county. The next phase will deliver to a further 34,500 premises by September 2018.

The new £6.8m programme extension will increase access to another 8,500 properties by 2019. This will boost superfast coverage to 97.4% of the county.

AIR AMBULANCE RECEPTION IN PARLIAMENT

Steve Brine attended a Parliamentary reception for Air Ambulances before Christmas, which gave MPs the chance to meet with air ambulance charities and ambulance services.

He said: "Our air ambulance crew, which covers Hampshire and the Isle of Wight, need to raise a staggering £275,000 each month just to keep flying, so I ask my constituents to take a look at what they do for our community."

MP HOLDS LATEST 'ASK^{THE}NHS' MEETING

Steve Brine held his latest public meeting on 12th January on the future of the local NHS.

The event heard from a top panel of key local clinicians, with the focus on the recently published Service & Transformation Plan (STP) which charts future health and social care services across the county.

The Q&A raised the link between the NHS and social care, the management of long term conditions, future NHS funding and local GP services, as well as the proposal from HHFT to build a new £350m Critical Treatment Hospital between Winchester and Basingstoke to care for the sickest patients.

Steve Brine said: "The NHS has been my number one priority from day one and, while we all know it's under great demand at this time we should all be really proud of what it delivers day after day and be positive about its future. The fact that was the overwhelming the tone of this meeting was just great."

DAN SMYTH WINS CHRISTMAS CARD COMPETITION

CONSERVATIVE CONTROLLED COUNTY COUNCIL CUTS CARBON EMISSIONS BY MORE THAN A THIRD

Energy efficient buildings and street lights have helped Hampshire County Council to cut its carbon emissions by more than a third since 2010 and to save £3 million for Hampshire taxpayers (£2.9 million in avoided energy costs and £200,000 of carbon tax savings).

Councillor Fiona Mather said "I welcome this news which is great both for Hampshire taxpayers and the environment."

This has been achieved by adoption of good energy saving habits by both HCC staff and Hampshire school pupils, by improvements such as re-roofing projects, boiler and lighting replacements and a major programme of street lighting replacements.

In addition 23 Solar Photovoltaic systems across the County Council's corporate buildings deliver efficiency savings of £45,000 per year, and generate 450,000kWh of power annually.

THE SECRET IS OUT...

Winchester is the best place to live in the UK in terms of quality of life, a study has found.

One key measure was Winchester's weekly earnings which were found to be 27% higher than the UK average, while crime, education, population densities and the weather were also taken into account.

The study found 96.6% of residents reported being in good or fairly good health, compared to a national average of 94.6%. Life expectancy rates were also higher than the national average.

Steve Brine said: "Seems the secret is out then. Of course those of us who live here know this to be true but I don't think we ever take it for granted. If this helps with investment into the city and spreading prosperity further across the area then it's good news.

"We should remember however, that Winchester has its challenges and pockets of relative poverty so nobody should see this as job done.

COUNTY COUNCIL FUNDS FURTHER DEVELOPMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH WELLBEING CENTRES

Hampshire County Council is committing nearly £6million over the next five years to supporting the expansion and development of the county's network of community based mental health wellbeing centres.

The Wellbeing Centres are currently provided by voluntary sector organisations with mental health expertise and act as a 'one stop shop' with a menu of services covering employment and housing, as well as a range of support to help people with their physical health as well as their mental health. People can self refer or are referred by their local GP. The centres also support people with more serious mental health conditions, working in conjunction with the local County Council/NHS mental health team.

In a further boost for mental health provision, Steve Brine has backed new government measures to transform the way we approach and deal with how youngsters receive support and care, and there will be new support for every secondary school to increase awareness and help tackle the unacceptable stigma around the issue.

WHAT'S HAPPENING IN WINCHESTER??

The City Council has set out its priorities for the next 3 years: promoting the local economy; ensuring that all residents have access to quality housing; improving health and happiness; and protecting and improving the environment of Winchester. With all Government grants being stopped, the Council will deliver these outcomes by being more efficient and entrepreneurial.

The City Council has purchased the Garrison Ground from Tesco. The 14 acres of playing fields at Bar End will be used by the community for sports and leisure purposes. This is great news for Winchester, as it gives us more options for delivering excellent new leisure facilities, which should be finished by 2019.

Plans to double the number of Council homes being built by Winchester City Council over the next 3 years will be achieved by the Council taking a fundamentally different approach from many other councils. In addition to the 92 new homes being built now, more will be started this year, helping more people to afford to live in Winchester.

KNOWLEDGE PARK AMBITION

Business leaders and the City Council have joined the University of Winchester and Steve Brine to launch ambitious plans for a local knowledge park.



They aim to bring hundreds of high-skilled jobs to the Sir John Moore Barracks site which the MoD have confirmed will close in 2020.

Steve Brine said: "I hear time and again from business leaders that we have a serious lack of commercial space in the city so this land becoming available could tie up well with our long-stated ambition to foster high quality, well-paid, employment."

FLY TIPPING INITIATIVE

Hampshire County Council recently hosted a workshop for landowners, the public sector and rural organisations to set a new vision for tackling fly tipping across Hampshire.

Cllr Jan Warwick said "In the past year I have reported several instances of fly tipping locally. It is illegal and a blight on our environment. Fly tipping is a drain on public resources. Many domestic items are recycled free of charge at the local household waste recycling centres. Authorities will work together to agree a new tougher line on enforcement and send out a clear message that fly tipping will no longer be tolerated."

HOUSEHOLD WASTE RECYCLING

Hampshire County Council has managed to reduce the annual running cost of its highly popular Household Waste Recycling Centre network by £1.55 million but has pledged to keep all the sites open.

Cllr Jan Warwick commented "I was pleased to hear Hampshire County Council has listened to our residents' opposition to any site closures. Savings have been found through reductions in opening hours, charging for cross border use, and for non-household waste rather than any full site closures."
